Grammar Geek

• **Job titles: We choose lower case** – At Capital Health, we follow the *Canadian Press Stylebook*, which says not to capitalize the initial letters of job titles. For example, we'd refer to **Chris Power**, president (CEO is different since it's an abbreviation for chief executive officer). Of course capitalizing job titles isn't grammatically incorrect; we just choose to keep titles lower case across the board for consistency. So if you send us something with the initial letters of job title in upper case and we change them to lower case, it's nothing personal. It's a style thing.
